# Olivet Connections


\* "Grace means that all of your mistakes now serve a purpose instead of serving shame." (Brene Brown)

In the past few months, you've read articles, heard announcements, and seen the calendar mentioning the Vision Team and the Dream Team. If you're confused about what in the world those words mean, who these people are, and what this means for the life and vitality of the congregation, you are not alone. We've been hearing a lot of WH questions around all of this. What are these teams? Who's on them? What are they doing or going to do? Why are they doing whatever? And What does this have to do with how Olivet is discerning what God is calling her to do?

Well, I hope to answer those questions here, and if you want to learn more, you can always ask Hannah, me, Board members or any of the folks who are engaging in these processes.

Let me help with making the distinction between the **Dream Team** and the **Visioning Team**. While it would seem from their names, that they should be one and the same, or are two teams doing the same thing, I assure you these are very different in focus, practice, and goals. Yet everything each of these teams are engaged in is very much a discernment process for empowering Olivet to be a more fully vital congregation.

The **Dream Team** got its name from immediate past Board President, Amanda Durbak, as we gathered together a group of individuals interested in and willing to brainstorm about various possibilities for use of Olivet's resources of place, facilities, and the serenity and beauty of our grounds. The ways that so many of you have worked to maintain and augment the special place that is Olivet is worth celebrating. As Olivet, like MANY congregations across this country, finds



itself with so much space that is open and under utilized during the week, discussions started about exploring ways to change that for the benefit of the community and the financial strength of Olivet.

Last November we invited Ron Gaus, Building Manager for Pilgrim Congregational UCC in St. Louis, to share with us projects he's undertaken with three different congregations in the St. Louis area that have helped turn around their underutilized space, and generate income to support ongoing and new ministries. Twenty folks gathered in the Multipurpose Hall to hear Ron's presentation, ask questions, and consider what Olivet's facilities might have to offer the community for office use, meeting space, events, kitchen usage, etc.

In early May, a group of eight interested individuals, most of whom had been at that November meeting, met with Ron, Hannah and myself to hear more of Ron's experience in working with congregations, and what his thoughts/impressions of Olivet's potential were. Ninety minutes later, we had discussed plenty, and some folks left with assignments. Research, conversations, and interviews followed over the next six weeks, and on June 16 we heard reports from Kim Amiot on event planning; Chester Edwards on conversations re: taxing, zoning, and legal considerations; and John Cuning on Boondock camping. That information was shared at the June Board meeting for discussion, feedback, and considerations. You will be hearing more about those conversations in coming weeks.

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In the meantime, you might have noticed a profusion of couches and chairs in various rooms. The Amiets happened upon an estate sale while looking for a lawn mower, and following up on conversations with wedding and event planners, they selected furniture that could be of use in rooms for grooms, brides, and attendants. Fear not, select pieces will stay, and others can be sold online.

The ***Dream Team*** will attract different folks at different times as projects show up, so if you're interested in participating, let Hannah, or me know.

The ***Vision Team*** is a spiritual formation process that will engage seven members of the congregation over a 6-7 month period taking a deep dive into scripture, dialogue with each other, Hannah, and Natalie, alongside the facilitation of Rev. Chad McMullin, Sr. Minister of First Christian Church, Sedalia. At the end of that initial time commitment, the Vision Team will arrive at a one page, front & back, document identifying the goals for Olivet over the next three years. Accomplishing these goals will engage many friends and members of Olivet in various ways, and with the full support and guidance of the Board.

While we are aware that Olivet has engaged in visioning processes over many years, this approach is unique in that it involves an in-depth encounter with scripture, focused dialogue with one another, and the guidance of an experienced, skilled facilitator to help move the process forward. The oft-heard frustration with visioning experiences is that even when it's been good, the ball gets dropped somewhere along the way. This approach strengthens the intentions, goal setting, and follow-through that can too often get lost along the way.



## Olivet Education Assistance Loan Fund

One of the challenges of a growing church, such as Olivet, is keeping newcomers informed of all the traditions, programming, and “perks” within our fellowship. For many in our congregation one of the “best kept secrets” is the Olivet Education Assistance Loan Fund.

In the 1970’s, Ham Holt (one of the pillars of Olivet) passed away. His family requested that a student loan fund be established in his memory. Contributions in lieu of flowers went into this fund, named the Holt Memorial Fund (later renamed Olivet Education Fund). A few years later his wife Edna also passed and memorial contributions for her were added to the loan fund. Under the guidance of Martin Behymer (longtime friend, neighbor and church leader) the Holt family established the criteria for the use of the fund. The fund was to be available for low interest loans to members of the community who needed money to begin or continue their education—vocational school, college or adult education. Administrators of the fund were to be Olivet’s minister, Board chair, and treasurer. The fund would be self-sustaining and open to other contribution for those who saw the benefit of the fund.



Olivet Christian Church Education Assistance Loan fund is to help members, family members, or friends of the church to attain a degree or certification from an accredited postsecondary educational institution. This is a loan which must be repaid.

The maximum loan amount is \$3,000 prorated over 2 semesters, 3 trimesters or 4 quarters a year. This is based on a full-time academic load of 12 hours. Loans to part time students will be prorated based on number of hours being taken. Loans are subject to the availability of funds.

Following graduation, or separation from school, the loan applicant has one of two options for repayment of the loan.

- Elect to repay the full balance of the loan within 1 year of graduation, or separation from school, with no interest charged; or
- Repay over time with an Annual simple interest charge of 5%.

Administrators are Senior Minister, Board chair, and Treasurer. Applications are available by contacting the church office or the church treasurer, Diane Bartley.

## Olivet Church Board Meeting - May 16, 2022, 7:00 PM

Board President, Joe Reeder called the meeting to order at 7:05 PM.

### Board Members Present:

Joe Reeder, Vickie Spain, Barbara Fitzgerald, Inge Decker, Jere Gillis, Tony Keel, Ginny Edgar, Dennis Bettenhausen, Sarah Frost, David Mast, Melissa Robinson,

### Staff Present:

Reverend Hannah Ryan and Reverend Coletta Eichenberger.

### Also present:

Treasurer Diane Bartley, and Finance Chair Ken Bartley.

Reverend Hannah Ryan opened the meeting with a prayer.

### Minutes:

Minutes for the April 2022 Board Meeting were reviewed. Dennis Bettenhausen pointed out a typo in Hannah Ryan's statement about her involvement with the wider church. Also, Dennis Bettenhausen wanted the statement he made regarding future insulation projects included in the minutes. Also, he pointed out the minutes did not mention the reference to the Vemer Fund as the funding source for the insulation project, which was included in the Property Committee's written proposal.

Vickie Spain made a motion to approve minutes with these corrections. Dennis Bettenhausen seconded the motion. The motion passed.

(Corrections were made to the official church copy of the April 16, 2022 Minutes on May 17, 2022 with the board vote on May 16, 2022 recorded with the corrections.)

### Treasurer's Report:

Treasurer, Diane Bartley presented the April 2022 financial statements. Diane noted that the April was in the black for the first time this year. She also noted a few expenses were already showing up for

the BBQ. Diane was asked by Dennis Bettenhausen how much we saved by the refinancing of the mortgage. Diane and Ken responded by stating that we would pay \$18,742 less in interest over the next five years. Diane also mentioned on the Budget to Actual Statement that there was \$5,000 income from the interest and dividends from the investments. This allowed us to utilize Outreach funds.

Inge Decker made a motion to approve the financial statements. Ginny Edgar seconded the motion. The motion passed.

### Finance Report:

Finance Chair, Ken Bartley reported April total income was the best month, so far this year. It was the second-best month for identified giving, with the income booked from dividends and interest. Total income was up 7% over last year. Expenses were up 2% compared to 2021. Prepaid pledges were up 76% over same time in 2021. We did purchase some LPL as this order was already set up for if it averaged down. While it appears we are reaching a new bottom, respected analysts are projecting the S&P 500 will reach 4200 to 5300 by end of the year.

### Minister Reports:

Reverend Hannah Ryan reports that she continues to work on worship and bible study. She is also working with John DeLaPorte from Broadway Christian Church to organize a youth mission trip in Columbia. The mission will be supported by Race Onward and will take place in the last week of July. They also met with Larry Brown to further the ties with Olivet and Race Onward as requested by the Program Council. There will be an interest meeting before worship on June 5 for those interested to learn more about Race Onward.

Hannah said they continue to search for an accompanist but have had no applications. We will look further to find the right connections for this

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position. Hannah also attended the property Dream Team meeting and has been involved in various other meetings for the Olivet visioning process.

Hannah received an update from Natalie Dixon Crewell and she plans to start part time and virtually in July 2022. She also intends to start full time in the office in August. She will give sermons virtually. Hannah also participated in a clergy ordination in Texas this past month. Hannah plans to take vacation the week of June 27-30.

Reverend Coletta Eichenberger reports leading worship and preaching. She focused on honoring the earth for worship materials for Earth Sunday and Larry Brown preached the sermon. She continued to participate in bible study, staff meeting and met with the Shepherds.

Coletta has been in communication with the Search & Call Team as they help Natalie make the transition. They will be discussing how to welcome her and help the congregation engage with her and get to know her. We will meet this Saturday about these things and will also celebrate the two-year journey and success with a potluck at Fosses.

The property Dream Team met on May 2 with Ron Gaus and Coletta and Hannah. The members attending were David Mast, Chester Edwards, Kim Amiot, John Cunning, Barb Wulff, Rocky and Mike Alden, and Vickie Spain. Ron shared some of the successes that he had with other churches. Some of these included commercial kitchen, created rental space for other businesses, and even created an apartment for one individual who was a long-term refugee. First the group should decide which space would not be available for alternate use by public. Some ideas discussed was boondocking or rental space for RV owners; contacting event planners with caveat that no alcohol is allowed on grounds; offering space for classes; smoker space for outdoor activities. The space will need to be evaluated, code systems would need to be

updated, additions to the camera system, and a hood above the stove for commercial use may be needed. June 13 or 15th will be the next scheduled meeting. There was a lot of brainstorming at this meeting.

Also, Hannah, Coletta and Joe Reeder met to work on the Visioning Leadership Team for Olivet to determine process for choosing the 7-9 individuals for the leadership team. These individuals will be working with Chad McMullin for 6-7 months and the goal is to have the first meeting on July 11. Hannah and Coletta also had a lunch meeting with Chad to discuss their view of visioning and to discuss book study and possible text to use for the visioning process.

### **New Business:** **Hybrid Meeting**

Joe Reeder stated that he had met with Robert Floyd about creating a hybrid meeting space. The bandwidth in Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall will need increased. Joe wanted to know from board how immediately we want to solve this problem. He thought we might need an Owl system eventually, but not necessarily immediately.

David Mast asked if we couldn't hardwire the wi-fi to the router for the sanctuary. David noted that if we rent out space, we will have to address this issue of internet access and speed. There was further discussion about access points, fiber/cable, and need for further research. The consensus of the board was that we need to make a target of getting this approved by September for the 2023 budget process. Therefore, we need to be able to make a board decision by the August board meeting, so that we may determine how to transition to a hybrid meeting in the new budget year.

### **Old Church**

Vickie Spain asked if there were some issues that needed resolved with the old church. David Mast explained that a groundhog had gotten trapped in

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the old church and chewed wiring on the sump pump. The sump pump did not work and then water backed up. David got a live trap and removed groundhog. Then, he bought a new sump pump for about \$115 and installed it.

Ken Bartley had informed him that they did get a check for some of the old church rent on Sunday toward the balance owed. The amount was unknown, but David said they had given tenants

until July to catch up and then planned to reassess at that time.

David Mast made a motion to adjourn board meeting. Jere Gilles seconded motion. Motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 8:03 PM.

## Missouri State Parks Series Part 2: Getting the Most Out of Your State Park Visit



Missouri state parks and historic sites are wonderful places to visit any time of the year. But a visit in January is a completely different experience compared to a visit in June. Below are a few suggestions for getting the most enjoyment out of your visit.

**Dress for the weather:** When planning your outdoor adventures, remember the Norwegian saying “there is no bad weather, only bad clothes”. In cold weather it is usually best to dress in layers. In hot weather dressing in light protective clothing and wearing sunscreen is a good idea. And any time of year you might need rain gear. Few things can ruin an outdoor adventure faster than being too hot, or too cold, and wet.

**Snacks and water:** Being hungry or thirsty also makes for miserable outings. Pack snacks and plenty of water to keep up your energy and stay hydrated.

**Check the park’s web site before visiting:** All of Missouri’s state parks and historic sites have a web page with current information on what each park and historic site has to offer. It will also list any closures due the storm damage or flooding. Go to Missouri State Parks ([mostateparks.com](http://mostateparks.com)) to review any park’s web page.

**Make camping and cabin reservations early:** Nearly all campsites and cabins in Missouri State Parks are now on a reservation system. During summer weekends and holidays, the campgrounds and cabins are usually full. Even if you are going midweek, reservations are highly recommended. You might also try camping during cold weather months. Having the campground all to yourself can be a rewarding experience; expect the water to be turned off and the restrooms closed.

**Be open to unexpected opportunities during your visit:** Missouri’s state parks and historic sites offer a wide variety of activities and experiences. Historic house tours, nature hikes, bird hikes, special events and special programs are all activities you might discover during you visit. Taking advantage of pleasant surprises can lead to a memorable experience (hint—try a bison saunter at Prairie State Park).


### Lakota Lockup Project
