## Greetings, Olivet Beloveds!

Thank you everyone for your generous sharing of items for new homes for our Afghan refugee neighbors. It was inspiring to see the bounty under the (at -first) bare tree turn into a beautiful addition to our Fellowship Hall for a few weeks.

In addition to the items requested on the "cross tags" on the tree, we received cash donations that allowed us to also purchase items requested just this week by Catholic Charities Refugee & Immigration Services, including LOTS of toilet tissue and 5 bike helmets. The families do not have cars, but are accustomed to using bicycles (which works very well in bike-friendly Columbia), so we were able to purchase a few used adult bike helmets.

The estimated value of our items was \$1,383; in addition, we had \$150 left that will be provided for additional items, or as a beginning for initial support for Ukrainians families expected in the near future. Joyce Mast and Linda Reed Brown delivered the items on Friday, April 22.



## Wondering About the Sign in Our Front Yard?

April was National Child Abuse Prevention Month. CASA invited community supporters to display a yard sign to help spread awareness about the important work CASA volunteers do for children in foster care. Last year, new CASA volunteers stepped up to be a voice for children because they saw these signs around town. ## Olivet Church Board Meeting - April 19, 2022, 7:00 PM

The board meeting of Olivet Christian Church was called to order by President Joe Reeder at 7:02 p.m. on Monday, April 19, 2022.

### Board Members Present:

Joe Reeder, Vickie Spain, Barbara Fitzgerald, Inge Decker, Jere Gillis, Tony Keel, Ginny Edgar, Dennis Bettenhausen, Larry Brown, Sarah Frost, Julia Jackson, David Mast, Nancy Foss, and Kaya Huffman.

### Staff Present:

Reverend Hannah Ryan and Reverend Coletta Eichenberger.

### Also present:

Bob Broz, Diane Bartley, and Ken Bartley.

Reverend Coletta Eichenberger opened the meeting with a devotion and prayer.

### Minutes:

for March 2022 were reviewed. Inge Decker moved that we accept the minutes as presented. Julia Jackson seconded the motion. The motion passed.

### Treasurer's Report:

Treasurer Diane Bartley provided financial statements to the board for March 2022. Diane noted that we dipped into the \$113,000.00 4-month reserve by about \$15,000.00. She also reviewed the March 2022 Budget to Actual statement with the board. David Mast made a motion to accept the March 2022 Financial Statements as presented. Inge Decker seconded the motion. The motion passed.

### Finance Report:

Finance Chairperson Ken Bartley noted that March has been our best month for identified giving in 2022. Financial expenses were higher than usual. This included \$1000 renewal of postage permit and additional mailings. Income was up 6.7 % and expenses were up 3.3%. The amount of the prepaid pledges increased by \$15,233.00 or a 46 % increase on March 31, 2022 over March 31, 2021.

Also, on the Balance Sheet the amount in the brokerage account has increased. This is because on March 24, we purchased 50 shares of ISUV fund at \$75.33 per share, which totaled \$3801.00. We also purchased 50 shares of ISUG on April 6, which will be reflected in April 2022 financial statements.

We finalized refinancing of the commercial loan with 4.49 % interest rate locked in for 5 years. The new addition will be paid off in 5 years. We received another \$500 check from the old church tenants, which will be applied to their accounts receivable balance. Prior to Reverend Dixon Crewell's start date, an amended 2022 Budget will be submitted to the board reflecting the addition of the new co-minister's compensation package.

### Minister Reports:

Reverend Hannah Ryan noted that she continues with Youth Group, Bible Study, and Worship and Wonder. She will take the day off on April 24. Staff has been helping library re-catalog books into a new system. Rev. Ryan officiated at the funeral and graveside service of Lynn Tatlow on April 4. She also had worked with Coletta and Adrienne on Holy Week Services. Rev. Ryan said she tries\* to be intentional about her involvement in the wider church community and participated in peer group sessions of Excellence in Ministry, Regional Board Meetings, and the ordination of a new minister.

Reverend Coletta Eichenberger said she had preached and participated in Worship each Sunday. She has been putting together the liturgy for Earth Sunday, April 14. Larry Brown will preach.

She had also assisted Hannah with Lynn Tatlow's funeral service. Hannah and Coletta, Vickie Spain, and Linda Graue met with Chad McMullen, the consultant on the visioning process. Chad also wants to visit with Hannah, Coletta, and Joe about prayerfully selecting the leadership visioning team to accept a 3-year process and commitment. This is a 6 to 7 month process. A letter of invitation will be

sent to those leaders. Natalie will also be included in this process.

Developing the Dream Team on the alternative property use is still in the works. A meeting with Ron Gaus is being arranged.

Coletta noted the happy results of the unanimous Congregational vote to Call Reverend Natalie Dixon Crewell.

Julia Jackson asked how the Dream Team members were selected. She had a concern that it was not multi-generational. There was clarification as to which team we were discussing and assurance that the visioning process would reflect a broader representation from various generations.

### **New Business:**

Bob Broz submitted a written proposal to the board along with making an in-person presentation\*\* from the Property and Sustainability Committees. The proposal recommended that we add insulation to the church building in order to reduce the carbon footprint and the cost of utilities. The amount added would give us an insulation factor up to R50. They sought 2 estimates and the best source seems to be NEMO. The cost of this phase for this year would be \$3300 to \$3800. Dennis Bettenhausen pointed out there would be future phases to this project with additional costs to insulate other sections of the building.\*\* Also, Bob Broz' written report suggested that the Vemer Fund as a possible resource for funding this project. David Mast made a motion to accept the proposal. Vickie Spain seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Joe Reeder noted the success of the Congregational Meeting with a unanimous vote for Reverend Natalie Dixon Crewell. He thought it "awesome that we had three unanimous votes of the Search and Call Team, the Board, and then the

Congregation in support of Calling Reverend Dixon Crewell."

Dennis Bettenhausen requested the ability to open for Seeds and Sprouts, so people could shop. With the drop in numbers, it was deemed acceptable via our guidelines.

Joe Reeder asked how we wanted to format the board meetings, whether in-person or on Zoom or with a hybrid format? If we do a truly hybrid meeting, we need some special equipment that is about \$1,000.00. A variety of discussion followed regarding how Kiwanis does a hybrid model, how the bank did conference calls, and other possible methods. Barbara Fitzgerald noted that we had several board members that were recruited this year based on keeping board meetings on Zoom. We also might need to consider accommodating staff members or board members who will not be in Columbia at times. Jere Gillis thought we needed to head in that direction. Julia Jackson said she was willing to investigate it. Hannah Ryan asked Julia to talk with Robert Floyd, who has agreed to help us with Tech issues. Joe Reeder volunteered to help as well.

President Joe Reeder welcomed Kaya Huffman and Nancy Foss. We need some housekeeping issues addressed as some board members did not get their board packet or notice and link for tonight's meeting.

David Mast moved to adjourn meeting. Julia seconded motion. Motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 7:55 PM.

## Missouri State Parks Series - Part 1 of 3 - History

Americans enthusiastically embraced the “parks movement” in the late 19th and early 20th century. On the national, state, and local levels, citizens discovered the benefits of government owned and tax supported outdoor spaces. A rapidly increasing number of people participated in outdoor recreational activities such as hiking, camping, hunting, and fishing. Missouri entered the parks movement in 1917 when the state legislature created a fund to buy and maintain state parks using 5% of the revenues from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses. By 1923 the fund had grown large enough to purchase the park system’s first property; the historic Arrow Rock Tavern (known today by its original name the J. Huston Tavern) in Arrow Rock, Mo.

More parks followed in 1924. Bennett Spring, Big Spring, Round Spring, and Alley Spring were the system’s first parks in the Ozarks. This area was already popular with campers and fishermen, so those parks focused on providing outdoor recreation. Mark Twain State Park in northeast Missouri was the state first park to commemorate a famous Missourian. Today the state manages a system of 92 parks and historic sites that preserve the finest examples of our natural and cultural



resources, and provide outdoor recreational opportunities.

Two aspects of Missouri State Parks are unique. First, most state park systems in the US charge an entrance fee. Missouri attempted collecting such a fee in 1973. Citizens were so outraged state park officials dropped the program after only a few months. No state park or state historic site in Missouri charges an entrance fee.

Second, Missouri state parks enjoys unusually strong citizen support. Over the years, funding for the parks have come from: a percentage of the revenues from hunting and fishing licenses (1917—1936); a mill tax (1945—1972); and general revenue. In 1984 Missouri voters imposed an additional sales tax on themselves to fund state parks and soil conservation. The parks and soils sales tax supplies 75% of the park system’s funding and carries a 10-year sunset clause. Voters have approved it every time it has come up for renewal. The tax was last renewed in 2016 when 80% of voters voted in favor of the tax; a true landslide.

Get out and enjoy Missouri State Parks and Historic Sites this summer. I look forward to hearing about your adventures.

## Christian Symbol

### Moving Ahead Program: "Connectedness above and beyond"

Rick Hess (Director of Resident Services at Columbia Housing Authority), Janice Brooks (Moving Ahead Program Administrator), and Michaela Flores (MAP Assistant Administrator) share the following information.



The Moving Ahead After-School Program (MAP) is a state licensed educational program administered through the Columbia Housing Authority. MAP runs at full capacity with approximately 70 (soon expanding to 110-120) students in grades K-12, and a passionate staff of two full-time administrators, 18 part-time teachers and support staff and well over 100 MU student volunteers. MAP provides an effective mix of one-on-one tutoring, social-emotional learning, and interactive academically enriching activities...and, most importantly, provides these services in a fun and safe learning environment. MAP offers free programs to all families regardless of their children's participation in MAP's after-school program.

- a free all-day summer camp that includes educational field trips and community programming to enhance the learning experiences.
- free snacks and dinners for all students during the school year and adds breakfast and lunch during the summer. These are too often meals that the children would not have if not provided through MAP.
- family development support, which is centered around relieving family barriers that challenge stable and conducive environments within the students' homes.

The Moving Ahead mission is "striving to achieve programming that creates connectedness between our students, families, and the community to foster a spirit of growth, learning, and positivity!"

**Yakira:** "MAP has been a blessing to myself and my family. When I walked through the doors – lost and did not know how to feed my family or have somewhere safe to take my kids – MAP was an open door. I am so thankful for the phrase 'above and beyond' because that's what the people at MAP represent. Being a part of this program is like being a part of a family."

**Tuesday:** "MAP has helped me and my grandchildren with anything we need, and they are always there for me. MAP is a blessing."

### **Sharp End Entrepreneurial Development Fund (SEED):** "Wealth-building to be financially self-sufficient"

The SEED fund supports minority and women-owned businesses in and around Columbia by providing financial assistance through grants and micro loans and mentoring.



"If you want to continue to build a generation of wealth, the way to do that is for folks to have their own and pass those companies and those businesses to the next generation," said Annelle B. Whitt, the chairperson of the SEED program to KOMU TV in a Feb 2022 interview. "That's a big part of wealth-building to be able to be self-sufficient financially. The SEED fund is here to continue the revitalization of the Sharp End holistically," Whitt said. "Now, those minorities and women may not be located on Walnut Street, but they're located throughout Columbia."

Geographically, the Sharp End is an historic business district between 5th and 6th Streets along Walnut Street. But urban renewal projects in the 1960s pushed Black-owned businesses out. Another aspect of the effort is to help ensure that the Sharp End remains a vital part of the history of Columbia. Financially and educationally, the Sharp

With only six months of warm weather to grow the herbs in Columbia, those two machines could store the harvested herbs to keep her inventory ready all around the year.

**“Believe in yourself and have faith in your abilities”**

Manager Karen Morgan says, “We have been open for a little over 2 years now. Over this period of time, we have had quite a few success stories.



**Story #1:** One that always comes to mind when I am asked for success stories is that we have survived the pandemic. We had only been open 3 weeks before things started being shut down. The support of the community has been overwhelming and has sustained us through this difficult time.”

**Success Story #2:** Tomas, our sight impaired employee, was very skeptical about training to be a barista. With lots of practice, encouragement and accommodations provided by the Rehabilitation Services for the Blind, he is being very successful as one of our regular baristas.

**Success Story #3:** We came to have a new Love Coffee Cafe in Tiger Hotel through a partnership that began in November of 2021. In order to be on the National Hotel Registry, Tiger Hotel had to have a coffee shop. The management team at the hotel really like our mission of hiring individuals with disabilities or other barriers to employment, so they asked us to open a location with them. The rest is history!



On behalf of our family, we would like to thank the ministers and caring team of volunteers who so selflessly gave of time and energy to support us during the funeral service for Lynn.
